## Clean Up Day is April 26

Residents of Shakopee, Louisville Township and Jackson Township will once again be able to drop off recyclable items and other refuse at the annual Clean Up Day on Saturday, April 26, from 7:30 - 11:30 a.m., behind the Shakopee Public Works building (400 Gorman St.). IDs will be checked to prove residency in one of the participating cities/townships.

The City will charge \$25 per vehicle (pick-up truck size or smaller) load of recyclable items. These items include: brush (cut in 6 ft. lengths and less than 3 ft. diameter), yard waste, tires (Four tire limit per vehicle. Additional tires are \$5 per tire off rim and \$6 per tire on the rim), electronics (microwave, stereo, regular TV), scrap metal, car batteries, and major appliances (Stove, refrigerator, freezer, dehumidifiers. Two appliance limit per vehicle.). Other refuse not listed may also be accepted. Call 952-233-9550 or 952-233-9391 TTY with questions.

Residents disposing of acceptable refuse other than what is described as recyclable will be charged a flat fee based on the type of vehicle used to transport the refuse. The fees will be \$25 per car, \$30 per trailer and \$30 per pick-up truck. An additional fee will be charged to dispose of these items: \$20 per mattress or box spring, \$25 per console TV or console stereo and \$10 per computer (monitor & CPU).

Several items will not be accepted at Clean Up Day. They include: liquids, chemicals and oils; light bulbs; paints and paint cans; tree logs or stumps; lumber; contractor building material debris; and water softeners.

During Clean Up Day, Shakopee Rotary also will be collecting donations of unwanted furniture and household items for Bridging, Inc. To make a donation, come directly to the north side of the Shakopee Public Works Building, 400 Gorman Street.

Bridging, Inc. serves people in need based on qualified referrals from Social Service agencies and churches in the seven-county metropolitan area. All donations are tax deductible (thrift market value). To qualify, donations should be in good condition, clean, undamaged and not worn beyond a respectable life. ## City Plans Arbor Day Tree Sale

City residents planning to plant a tree this year are invited to stop by the Shakopee Arbor Day Tree Sale on Saturday, April 26 from 1-3 p.m. at the Public Works building (400 Gorman Street). Two-inch diameter balled and burlapped trees will be sold to Shakopee residents at cost plus tax. The price range for trees is \$116 - \$135. Please bring a driver's license for residency verification.

Ten of each of the following trees will be available at the sale: American Linden, Red Maple, Hackberry, Autumn Blaze Maple and Thornless Honeylocust. Trees will be sold on a first-come, first-served basis on the day of the sale. These trees do not have warranties. Additionally, the person purchasing the tree will be responsible for picking up the tree and planting it. These trees are approximately 12 to 14 feet tall and weigh between 250 and 300 pounds.

Residents who would like to plant a tree in a City easement or boulevard will need to submit a Tree Planting Permit Application and receive approval before planting the tree. There is no charge for this permit. Before digging a hole for the tree, visit [www.gopherstateonecall.org](http://www.gopherstateonecall.org) and call 651-454-0002 to have underground utilities marked.



## Bridge Closure Announced

This spring, Scott County will be replacing the CR 101 Bridge over the Mill Pond (located east of Marschall Road and west of Sarazin Street). The bridge will be closed to traffic from March through approximately late June. Then the bridge will open to one lane of traffic in each direction until the expected completion date in August. Detours will be posted to direct drivers to alternative routes. During the construction period, drivers will still have access to Memorial Park, Murphy's Landing and businesses off of Sarazin Street between CR 101 and Fourth Avenue. ## The Survey Says...

Thank you to the more than 250 BlueXpress bus riders who completed a survey on the BlueXpress bus service last fall. Information from the survey will help Shakopee, Prior Lake and Scott County transit officials in planning future routes and schedules, as well as finding ways to ensure the service meets riders' needs and expectations.

Following are highlights of the survey results:

- 83.48 percent of the respondents use the BlueXpress bus service four or five times a week, with the most popular morning routes being the 6:15/6:24 a.m. and 7:42 a.m. The most popular routes in the evening are the 4:20 p.m. and 5:09 p.m.
- Both driver safety and driver customer service received a high percentage (94.6 percent and 92.79 percent respectively) of excellent and good ratings from respondents.
- When asked about the Cost of Ride/Value, 51.35 percent rated it as excellent, 32.43 percent rated it as good, 9.01 percent rated it average, and .45 percent rated it as poor (the remainder did not respond).
- When asked how the BlueXpress services "Meets My Travel Needs," 43.69 percent rated it as excellent, 33.33 percent rated it as good, 14.86 percent rated it as average, 3.6 percent rated it as below average and .45 percent rated it as poor (the remainder did not respond).

## Planning Begins on Eagle Creek Park and Ride



Preliminary plans are in the works for another BlueXpress bus park and ride facility. The Eagle Creek Park and Ride is anticipated to be located at the intersection of future CR 21 and CR 16. It will sit on approximately 16 acres and house at least 545 parking stalls. Site acquisition and design details are still being determined; however, construction on the site is slated to begin in 2009. Watch for more information.

Property owners in Shakopee who do not agree with their property valuation or classification may appeal it at the meeting. All persons wishing to appeal a valuation/classification will need to show cause for having the valuation corrected. Residents with questions about their valuation are encouraged to contact the Scott County appraiser at 952-496-8772 prior to the meeting.

Taxes levied on a property are based on its valuation. Although the board cannot change the tax rate, it can help to assure an accurate valuation.
